emerging pattern, but


I do not know what it

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The Beloved Disciple

Today's church celebrates the Easter Season from the Resurrection until Pentecost. The gift of the Holy Spirit is one of the church's founding aspects of the Resurrection. But for the first apostles and disciples, this time was a major crisis. Many of them had expected that Jesus would instigate the overthrow of the Romans and restore Israel to its former glory. Others at least hoped that he would be recognized as the great unnamed prophet that was mentioned in Deuteronomy18. Either way they would have become powerful associates. But Jesus didn't fulfill any of these expectations and all their hopes were lost. Even worse he was taken prisoner and condemned by the Jewish authorities and put to death by the Romans. They were both disgraced and in despair. Only in St John's gospel is a disciple mentioned who did not lose hope. He is not mentioned in the synoptic tradition because he had no great name or rank. In John 20:2 although not an apostle, he was identified as "the disciple whom Jesus loved" and to the Johannine followers this was the criterion for greatness.

As he stood at the foot of the cross, the dying Jesus entrusted His mother into the care of this unnamed disciple. "Mother behold your son and to the

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een Haunted House in current St. Rocco storage barn in past Octobers and they sold Christmas trees and wreaths in December for a number of years. Masses at St. Mary's once offered "folk music" at the 12 PM Mass. The Mass schedules at St. Mary's have changed over time in order to best address the needs of the parishioners of St. Mary Parish. the construction will begin outside by the end of April and inside after May 8th. The completion date will take a lot of prayers, but we hope it is substantially completed by October. We will transfer all funerals during the week to Saint Jude, Norfolk. They are most welcoming to us. When the inside of the upstairs church was painted few years ago, we also did this. We will have the church for weekend Masses. Downstairs the chapel will be open every day via the wooden side door towards the garage. The St. Vincent de Paul will have access to its food pantry and working space, but all other activities need to cease in these spaces. We all know when you do rehab or renovation in our homes that it is inconvenient and messy at times. So, all of us have to be cooperative to get the whole project done.

Our Parish Plan for (Adult) Faith Development and also Vocations is on track. This is good news because goals and objectives can lag behind expectations. We all know the pace and level of activity at Saint Mary's is far higher than in most parishes and we have to be careful not to lose sight of the important goals.


This faith year we launched a Men's Spirituality Program that meets monthly. This has been under the direction of Deacon Guy and a Steering Committee. Each month men meet on a Saturday morning for about one hour and watch and then share a CD of Bishop Barron on Catholicism. Among all the meetings about 60 men are actively involved.

At our Cemetery which is so beautifully maintained, a new ground section has been prepared for use. Many of us have family or friends who now rest in peace at Saint Mary's. We are also working on a site plan to develop mausoleum walls for interment of urns with cremains. Folks have asked us to develop this for the resting place for their beloved ones and we

are now doing so. These memorial walls will be of gray and black granite and each individual crypt in the wall will be able to hold two sets of cremains. This new area will allow folks to have a dignified and proper place to place the cremains and to honor their memory of their loved ones. To honor the memory of our beloved dead is a duty and also a privilege which requires proper care. It is wonderful the amount of praise people give for our Parish cemetery. Indeed, it is the best maintained parish cemetery I have ever seen. And this is due to others, especially Joe Spencer.

We all are aware that the Benjamin Franklin Public Charter School has announced that it is leaving our school building on June 30, 2019. Even though this announcement of leaving has occurred many other times, I think it seems reasonable that this time they may succeed. They have changed their service area now to include the many, many surrounding towns. Because they

Endless Gifts of Love

We are born to be conduits of God's messages. We can, if we agree, become messengers of Christ's presence in the mundane moments of each ordinary day. Whether we chose to or not, as we live each day, we always leave footprints. Christ, as a parting gift of love, promised to send the Paraclete to guide us. As long as I can remember I had devotion to the Paraclete. Possibly because I didn't think it was particularly complimentary to be identified as a bird or a ghost, but more probably because I knew I was in constant need of guidance. I recall my mother's constant reminder to me as I was going out the door. "People can't hear what you are saying because what you are doing is shouting at them."

Indians have a practice as winter is coming on. At the feast of the "Hungry Moon" they lay out a blanket and everyone in the tribe puts items that they can share on it. It might be food, clothing, utensils, blankets, toys or a cherished homemade item. Then the members of the tribe choose something that they need to get them through the coming winter. Like this "giving blanket" the Paraclete lays out the gifts we need to get through our daily lives. These gifts are skills that can be perfected by practice. (Watch a young child learning to catch a ball or tying the laces on shoes.) So as we consciously practice the gifts, they become habits that can more easily be used in working as God's instrument.

Jesus Christ is Victorious

On the introductory "set-up piece" to Catholic TV's daily broadcast of the Mass, you see the elevation of the Eucharistic host. Notice the design impressed upon the host. This design imitates the practice of the Eastern Rite Churches in decorating the altar bread for the Eucharist. This Greek-language monogram proclaims "Jesus Christ conquers" or "Jesus Christ is victorious." This artistic declaration recalls the Easter Proclamation's praise for the victory of Jesus: "...This is the night when Christ broke the prison-bars of death and rose victorious (victor ascendit) from the underworld." The Easter hymn Alleluia let the holy anthem rise contains an echo of the Easter Proclamation in these words in verse two: he has risen up in triumph from the darkness of the grave. Reflection upon these words of the tradition prepares us to listen anew to the opening prayer of Easter Sunday. In this prayer the Church addresses God the Father: ...through your beloved Son [you]

able to give life after death. As heirs to the Christian biblical tradition we believe that God the almighty Father has already decisively displayed this power to give life after death by raising Jesus his onlybegotten Son from the dead on the third day, Easter day. We rejoice that Jesus has promised to share his risen life with us -"Because I live you also will live" (John 14:19).

The Catechism of the Catholic Church, paragraph 638, proclaims: "The Resurrection of Jesus is the crowning truth of our faith in Christ, a faith believed and lived as the central truth by the first Christian community...and preached as an essential part of the Paschal Mystery along with the cross: 'Christ is risen from the dead! Dying, he conquered death; to the dead, he has given life' (Byzantine Liturgy, Troparion of Easter)."

Theologians have placed the Resurrection of Jesus at the center of Christian faith and practice. This resurrectional focus for our prayer and meditation seems in need of being frequently refreshed and sharpened. With the Resurrection of the Lord Jesus, we believe that we all have a place in the new creation. For us, every Sunday is Easter, the Lord's Day when we celebrate together the Resurrection of Jesus Christ. When we gather as the Christian people at worship, we declare that the Lord Jesus is risen.

There Is A Time For Every Season

In the book of Ecclesiastes, we are told there is a time for everything and I truly believe this.

It is with a lot of prayer and some emotion that I have decided to retire from my position of Pastoral Associate/Parish Nurse. Retirement brings me much excitement of the anticipation of spending more time with family and friends and travel especially in the winter months to warmer climates, however there is sadness in my heart because I have had so much joy ministering here at this special place.

I cannot believe that I have been in ministry here for over twenty years! How did that happen? I began exploring Parish Nursing in 1995 and with the support of Fr. Tom Walsh was asked to come on staff in a permanent position as Coordinator of Health and Homebound Ministry. In the years that followed, I was supported by Fr. David Callahan. I was led by God to complete my Master's degree in Theology and Pastoral Ministry at Providence College. I enjoyed being part of the deaconate class, getting to know many deacon candidates in the Providence Diocese. I went on to complete four units of Clinical Pastoral Education

which led to my becoming certified as a Catholic Chaplain. As the Pastoral Associate role increased, I became certified and then was asked to be on the certification committee, certifying new PAs. All of this education has helped me in the ministry work here at St Mary's and in my life. My Dad would always remind me that education is never lost.

While I was here at St. Mary's I was blessed to minister to those who were sick and homebound, many who were grieving and in need of care and support. You grieved with me when my mother died six weeks after being diagnosed with terminal cancer and you prayed for me as I went through cancer surgery. My surgeon was surprised to see how calm I was and I told him it was because my parish family was praying for me and him! It has been an honor to facilitate the bereavement support group as God generously blessed me with the gift to help heal those who are grieving.

One area of this ministry that pleasantly surprised me was becoming a supervisor to the second year seminarians from Pope Saint John XXIII Seminary in Weston for their Pastoral Ministry experience. For six years I have introduced seminarians to our wonderful parishioners who are homebound or in facilities and they have welcomed these men and taught them the importance of a listening presence when ministering to those in need.

You welcomed me into your homes and your hearts and I will take all that I learned from you with me as I journey on to my next chapter. Fr. Brian has given me caring, pastoral support and guidance so that I could help those in need; Fr. Jack has helped me to guide the seminarians in their pastoral year of formation so that they can become compassionate, caring priests. Deacon Guy continues to share his ministerial gifts with others and I feel he and his wife Sheila are a special team and a caring addition to our parish family.

As I begin a new journey I am beginning to see glimpses of what God has planned for me. I have been hosting a Senior Cable show for a year and find it challenging and exciting. It is a different way for me to educate seniors and help them to be aware of programs and resources as well as staying updated with local and state events along with going back in time.

I will be completing a two year Spiritual Director program in May and look forward to providing Spiritual Direction for those who seek to know God in a personal way. I have begun to dabble in painting, (no pun intended) and I am hoping to uncover a little mini Monet. I plan to take some extended time in my hammock this summer along with preparing all of the quahogs Jim will harvest. The great stuffed quahog contest continues!

So as I leave this ministry I take with me all that you have taught me and will continue to use my experiences wherever God takes me. St Mary's will continue to be my parish family and I look forward to exploring new ways to volunteer and share my gifts and nurture my spirit. I have begun praying for your new Pastoral Associate and those on the selection committee. I will keep the parish, clergy, pastoral and professional staff in my prayers as I ask you to pray for me and my family.

(Continued from page 1) disciple "behold your mother" (John 20:3-8) and so he takes her to his

20:3-8) and so he takes her to his home. In the chronicles of the community at Ephesus he is greatly revered.

In the last chapters of John, the beloved disciple is mentioned several times. He goes to the tomb with Peter and on seeing the burial clothes folded carefully he believes it is proof of the resurrection rather than a body robbery. Later when the apostles go fishing on the sea of Galilee and get no fish the stranger on the shore tells them to cast their nets on the other side to catch the fish It is the beloved disciple who recognizes that the man on the shore is Jesus. He tells Peter, who jumps out of the boat to go to Jesus.

Although he is only briefly mentioned in one gospel, I find him a great model for the majority of the members of the church. Like many members of our universal church, he was not a person of authority or apparently individually important in the church.

He is only known for:

- his undaunted love for Jesus
- his care of Jesus' loved ones His mother and his other followers
- his pointing out Jesus to others who might not recognize Him (as he did for Peter at the sea of Galilee)

For those simple things he earned the title "the disciple whom Jesus loved" The job description is reasonably easy to imitate. The title is awesome!

During the Christmas season, all of our students in Grades 1-8 were very generous to our military. Tons of personal care items, snacks, books, puzzles, socks, etc. were donated.


These items were put into boxes and delivered to our troops worldwide.



We were able to send boxes to some soldiers who are friends and family to some of our Religious Education students. Along with the items, some of the cutest handmade cards from our kids were sent. We received many thank you notes from the soldiers - the following is an example of how much these donations mean to the military:

Hello my name is Chris Betances and I'm with the 82nd Airborne Division currently deployed to Afghanistan. What is Faith Formation All About?

Catholic Faith Formation Education is designed to help Catholics deepen their relationship with God and recommit themselves to the responsibility of sharing their faith with others.

The Church's catechetical mission aims to help the faithful of <u>all</u> ages to grow in both human and Christian maturity, enriching the whole of life with the Gospel.

We try to touch all faith dimensions of an adult life: communicating the faith, skills needed for the faith growth, the experience of family life, relationships, community service and concern for the common good. Our adult faith formation ministry engages the particular needs and interests of the adults in our faith community.

Three major goals guide and direct our efforts in adult faith formation as directed by the *United States Conference* of Catholic Bishops (USCCB):

- 1. Invite and enable ongoing conversion to Jesus in Holiness of Life
- **2.** Promote and support active membership in the Christian Community
- 3. To call and prepare adults to act as disciples in the mission to the world.

How can we do this?

Sunday liturgy
Sunday liturgy is the center of our
Church's life. It is the place where the

largest number of people is catechized regularly - through communal prayer, homilies, music, hospitality, the environment, web site, and even the bulletin!

Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults (RCIA)

RCIA is focused on those who are joining the Church & provide a deepening education opportunity to address our faith at an adult level.

Parent sacrament sessions

These sessions provide parents a knowledge and understanding of the faith to help raise and connect with their children through the sacrament process.

Marriage preparation

Marriage preparation assists couples that are preparing for marriage and being connected to the life of the parish. It provides a good opportunity to address/discuss their faith in a deeper relationship. The Archdiocese uses a program called *Transformed in Love*.

Catechist training

This training continually emphasizes the importance of ongoing formation and providing opportunities for catechists to take courses, attending conferences, provide resources, & develop team meetings.

Advent & Lent

These liturgical seasons provide several designated weeks to provide a short-term, highly motivated time for faith formation through session, holy hour, Stations, adoration...

Retreats

Retreats, whether day or weekend, can truly set an adult's heart burning. Parishbased retreats have the added value of forming a community ready to go deeper. Several retreat centers are located close by such as La Sallette in Attleboro, Betania II in Medway and Our Lady of Fatima in Holliston.

Parish Ministries

Parish ministries and organizations are involved in witnessing and evangelizing our faith. Take time at training sessions to do things like reminding ushers that their greetings at the door may be the welcome needed to turn a seeker into a member. We all have gifts to bring to the community of faith table. St Mary's has many ministry opportunities listed on the web site.

Weekly/Monthly study or faith groups The variety of Bible study and formation programs available today is tremendous. In addition, the U.S. Catholic Catechism and other resources provide easy-to-use resources for group study on multiple faith topics. Again, St Mary's has Bible Study, Rosary group, Men's formation...
